### **EXHIBITIONS**

THE YEAR 2017 was heralded in with the creative cacophony of Tanya Pixie Johnson's *Edge of the Light* installation juxtaposed with *George A. Meeres*. The summer saw the legacy of *Jack Shadbolt* and *Train Dreams* followed into the fall by the *River Relations* group show and the floor-to-ceiling celebration of community that was the 2017 *Member Show*. Carrying over from November 2017 to February 2018 was the *Upstream Benefits* exhibition and *Art Deco in Modern Times* guest-curated by the inimitable duo of Jane Merks and Peter Bartl.

The 2017 exhibition schedule in total consisted of nine exhibitions in Gallery A and B which by turns engaged with our arts and heritage communities, supported the work of local and International artists (past and present), and investigated arts and culture through a variety of media and methodology.

TANYA PIXIE JOHNSON is an artist defined by her obsessive sorting and gathering; of found materials, ideas and human experiences. With roots in rural British Columbia Tanya P's practice has an astounding reach due to her penchant for residencies in far-flung places and an unrelenting engagement with land, people and place; both ephemeral and essential. From her birth in Nairobi, Kenya and childhood in South Africa, to her bohemian wandering in Europe, to her current place in the Kootenays, Tanya P has delved deeply and with a focused abandon into the dichotomies of human experience. In between the shadows of influence and idolatry beats the heart of pure and unrelenting artistic inquiry. Integrating the aesthetic of collage, assemblage and found art, a cabinet of curiosities meets ceremonial altar. Fetish meets artifact. Ritual object meets family photo album. Flotsam and jetsam meet the edge of the bog. Light meets dark.


Edge of the Light explored notions of paradigm and ideas of meaning found at allegorical edges and in liminal spaces.



JACK SHADBOLT: MOMENTUM explored the diverse, seven-decade-long art practice of the formidable Jack Shadbolt (1909-1998). Works included early 1930s sketches, commissioned silkscreen play posters, painterly abstractions, and lithographs in this touring exhibit from the Burnaby Art Gallery, curated by Jennifer Cane.

Jack Shadbolt had a long a wide-ranging career: student, war artist, teacher, muralist and artist of the highest order (Order of Canada, 1972). Shadbolt lived in several regions of Canada, including the Interior of British Columbia and Saskatchewan, but the majority of his life was spent on the West Coast.

Jack Shadbolt was a friend and contemporary of Emily Carr, he was influenced by Pablo Picasso, and developed a style which beautifully marries the honesty and observation of landscape with the commentary of social realism.

USING ART AS A VISUAL and narrative critical tool, *River Relations* was a multi-disciplinary group exhibition that investigated the ecological and social impact of hydroelectric dams on the Columbia River. The fourteen dams, in BC, Washington and Oregon are heralded for massive energy production and economic benefits; however, they have incurred environmental costs and impacted the lives of many in the surrounding watershed regions.

This exhibition was intended to create a space for creative contemplation, thoughtful dialogue and involved citizenship. It engaged with the specific geography of the Columbia River region and the hydro-electric dams that have impacted it, as well as larger issues around watershed governance, natural resource use and ecological sustainability.

UPSTREAM BENEFITS was an evolutionary project from word one. Through the lens of ten artists who represent a wide gamut of artistic enterprise, the exhibit explored the who/where/what/when/why of artist-run culture, and the evolution of present day artistic practice in the Kootenays. The participating artists were: Courtney Andersen, Susan Andrews Grace, Amy Bohigian, Brent Bukowski, Boukje Elzinga, Ian Johnston, Maggie Shirley, Natasha Smith, Deborah Thompson and Rachel Yoder. The exhibition was a way of celebrating both place and process – how artists create the culture that in turn support their ever-evolving practice, a snake-eating-its-own-tail sort of paradox if ever there was one. The call and response format of the *Upstream Benefits* exhibition allowed the artists to present an early and a more recent work and contextualize the place/process and particulars which contributed to the works' creation and the evolution of the artists' practice.


**Train Dreams: Common Collective**

TRAIN DREAMS was an experimental three-channel video installation that examined the nature of memory and time by exploring history through railway culture. The exhibition included animation, regional and international new and archival video footage, and an original sound design. This exhibition was a collaboration between four artists and portrayed memory as a phenomenological, dream-like process. It did not unfold in a linear narrative way, but instead through a sequence of enactments, dissipations, and transformations. *Train Dreams* engaged the viewer in a visceral process of sensory oscillation and played with sense perceptions; creating experiences of scenes, shapes, spaces, colours, textures, and sounds, that blended together to form ambiguous impressions of the past.

GEORGE A. MEERES was a professional photographer who moved to Nelson in 1924. Soon after he purchased the Campbell Art Gallery (which would later become Vogue Photographic), which he ran until 1936. Always detailed and meticulous in his work, he later adopted the motto, "a good photo or none!"

Drawn from the Shawn Lamb Archives at Touchstones Nelson, this exhibit featured reproductions of some of the cellulose nitrate photos he took during his time in Nelson. Startling in their depth and composition, the photos are a testament to his skill and vision as a photographer. They also offer a fascinating glimpse into our community at that moment in time, through the groups, businesses and landscapes he documented.

THERE HAS BEEN little attention paid to our architectural heritage built after the end of World War 1. However, there are many buildings, public and private, from the 1920s into the 1950s that deserved appreciation in the Art Deco exhibition, including the Capitol Theatre (1925), the Terrace Apartment (1929), the Medical Arts Building on Baker (1930), The Civic Centre (1935), the Chrysler Dealership on Hendrix (1936), and the Scandinavian Church (1933). This exhibition truly challenged all to look at their hometown in a new way, to see the architectural beauty we may walk by every day.



### THE COLLECTION AND SHAWN LAMB ARCHIVES

IN JANUARY 2017 Jean-Philippe Stienne took up the position of Archivist and Collections Manager at Touchstones. JP comes to us from the Musée Héritage Museum in St Albert, Alberta where he worked since 2013. He has moved from Edmonton to join us, along with his wife Emma and their three girls. JP is originally from near Manchester in the UK. In addition to his position in St Albert, he has more than 10 years collections and curatorial experience working in a range of museums in the UK including Dove Cottage (the home of the poet William Wordsworth), Norton Priory (a medieval monastery) and the National Coal Mining Museum.

Forty-one accessions were added to the Touchstones Nelson collection in 2017. Highlights included The West Kootenay Women's Association Archive, Olympic Rower Lorne Loomer memorabilia and a summit chair from the Whitewater Ski Resort. Photographs from the Archives also feature in two local history books published in 2017 – Journeys Taken: Selkirk College –The First 50 Years by Takaia Larsen and Bob Hall and The Modern Heritage of Nelson Architecture by Peter Bartl.

One hundred and thirty-three research enquiries were answered by the Archivist and Archive volunteers. This is the highest number of logged enquiries for five years. 39% of these enquiries came from Kootenay individuals and businesses. We also had enquiries from Sweden, New Zealand and Argentina. The most popular enquiries were regarding the SS Nasookin and the Nelson streetcars. A record number of seven house histories were also completed. Details of all enquires are saved on the Inmagic Research Database.

In October a Historical Treasures Sale was held between the Museum and the Post Office and raised around \$7,000 towards the Collections Move. The following month an "army of volunteers" helped the Archivist move around 60% of the collection from the old museum site on Anderson Street to the new Bunker site. The remainder of the collection will be moved in 2018.

## First World War Kootenay Soldiers Photograph Project

IN THE SUMMER of 2017, Touchstones welcomed Simon Fraser University student Tressa Ford, who embarked on a research project on 200 Kootenay First World War soldiers featured in a photograph album held in the archive.

Tressa spent much of the summer researching the stories behind these soldiers, including many who sadly did not survive the war. During the First World War the Nelson Canadian Club gathered this remarkable collection of around two hundred individual and group photographs of Kootenay area soldiers. In 1985 this collection was donated to Touchstones.

The combination of the photographs of young men volunteering to fight for their country and the biographic details of horrific injuries and fatalities is incredibly powerful. For the first time the whole collection, together with brief biographies is now available to view online via the Touchstones Flickr pool. The photographs and Tressa's findings were put online in August, and to date have received over 90,000 views. There have now been over 3.7 million hits on the Touchstones Flickr pool since its launch in 2010.









### SPECIAL PROJECTS

THE BUNKER and Collections Move project moved forward with enthusiasm in 2017. With great support from the City of Nelson, Touchstones confirmed our lease to the Bunker located in the basement of the Gray Building in March of 2017. The Society managed to secure several major grants, including a Columbia Basin Trust Built Heritage Assets grant, which pushed the renovations forward.

In December of 2017, with the support of Fairbank Architects and Dan Maglio Contracting, the "Life and Safety Upgrades" were completed, and 60% of the permanent collection was moved from 402 Anderson to the Bunker. It is with great excitment that we watch this project moving ahead, and we look forward to sharing the continuing progress in the coming year.
















### THE SHOP

THE SHOP had a smashing year in 2017, showing another year of upward growth in revenue and profits. Nelson is on the map - both locals and international tourists are finding gifts that reflect and enhance their visit to Touchstones and Nelson.

The Shop continues to source new work by Nelson and Area artist and authors, ensuring visitors are exposed to some of the best of Nelson artisan wares. Ceramics were a huge hit in the Shop this year – we've added two new lines and now partner with 10 local potters. Kate Bridger's original textile pieces continue to be successful. The work of our local artists are decorating more and more walls, both local and as far away as Korea.

We have so much appreciation for the talented artists we get to represent, the dedicated volunteers who work with us to make the Shop a place that our fabulous customers keep returning to for original, handmade gifts.



### 2017 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS


