MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



The past year has been an eventful one marking several changes in our Society.

Firstly, last summer saw the Ladybird emerge from storage at 402 Anderson in time for an appearance leading the Road Kings car event parade down Baker Street. The emergence was orchestrated by board member Jerry Sussenguth who worked tirelessly in the weeks prior to the event for which the Society is truly grateful. It produced numerous smiles and recollections from observers at her static

display following the parade, all expressing great joy at seeing her again.

Our executive director Leah Best resigned her position in August of 2016 to take on a new role at the Royal BC Museum in Victoria. After a diligent search for a replacement, the Board was delighted to discover and employ Astrid Heyerdahl as its new Executive Director. Astrid comes to the society bearing impressive credentials and experience and has already demonstrated her innovative ideas, spirited approach and deep appreciation of Touchstones and the ideals for which it stands. The Board is confident that she will provide the valuable leadership qualities required of her position and is looking forward to working with her in the future.

After several years in the planning, I am pleased to advise that we now have entered into a long term lease of the Bunker area in the Grey building next door. We are indebted to the City of Nelson and in particular Kevin Cormack for the innovative approach that resulted in this lease. Plans are underway for the move of our collection that is currently at the 402 Anderson facility into the new space which was constructed during the Cold War era to provide a safe haven for a few dozen people in the event of a nuclear attack. Not only will it provide a secure depository for a portion of our collection and archives, it will also provide an interesting space for guided tours and discussion about our not so distant past.

As I am 'aging out' of my term as a board member, I wish to give my sincere thanks and appreciation to all of the board members with whom I have served, to Leah Best during her tenure and of course to the staff of our organization for their dedication, loyalty and ideas.

SOMEWHERE BETWEEN a Through the Looking-Glass sense of distortion and a scientific exactitude we found Lou Lynn's *Out of the Ordinary.* The exhibition combined the rigours of contemporary craft with the intellectual inquiry of the avant-garde. The viewer was (re) introduced to the most humble of artifact, honed, honoured and re-contextualized. In a world surfeited with consumer goods, Lynn's sculptures provoked recognition of the truly exceptional properties of familiar objects and the inherent quality, form and function of things which are often overlooked.

REGENERATION evoked a minimalist design and aesthetic with tightly bounded compositions of gravel and rocks and sparse vegetation. The artists involved: Tsuneko Kokubo & Toru Fujibayashi are senior artists with extensive, fascinating and variant backgrounds. Both artists experienced various aspects of Canada's Internment policy of Japanese Canadian citizens during the Second World War, an occurrence which deeply influenced their lives. *Regeneration*, at its heart, is a way of seeing; a study of memory and the motivations and methods with which we are able to understand lives lived. As the title tells us, these works are about life and death, but they also give us a glimpse of the doing in between.

THE COLLECTION AND SHAWN LAMB ARCHIVES

FORTY-EIGHT ACCESSIONS were added to the Touchstones Nelson collection in 2016. Highlights included three woodcuts by Wayne King, a 1930s steel guitar and 1915 photographs of soldiers from the 54th Battalion (Kootenay). In 2015 the Shawn Lamb Archive completed a digitization project involving over 500 colour slides taken by Ron Waters from the late 1950s to the early 1980s of hydroelectric development in the Kootenay Region. The collection is now accessible through the Changing Waters online exhibition.


Seventy-three research enquiries were answered by the Archivist and Archive volunteers. 39% of these enquiries came from Kootenay individuals and businesses. 28% were from other parts of British Colombia and one enquiry was from Sweden. Family history/obituaries accounted for 34% of all enquiries. Topics included Balfour Ferry tolls, the Tremont Hotel and the 1960s farmers market. Five House histories were also completed in 2015. Details of all enquires are saved on the Inmagic Research Database.

Laura Fortier was the Archivist and Collections Manager at Touchstones Nelson for over 6 years. Laura worked with Shawn Lamb to bring the archives and collection to the next level by generating important policies and procedures and ensuring the professional handling of all archive and collection materials. Laura left Touchstones in October 2016 to pursue an excellent position in Saskatchewan. One of Laura's last actions as Archivist and Collections Manager was to write a successful Museums Assistance Program grant for the Diefenbunker Collections Move in the amount of \$18,000 (the grant was received in February 2017). Thank you, Laura!

In November 2016 Jean-Philippe (JP) Stienne accepted the position of Archivist and Collections Manager at Touchstones. JP comes to us from the Musée Héritage Museum in St Albert, Alberta where he worked since 2013. He has moved from Edmonton to join us, along with his wife Emma and their three girls. JP is originally from near Manchester in the UK. In addition to his position in St Albert, he has more than 10 years collections and curatorial experience working in a range of museums in the UK including Dove Cottage (the home of the poet William Wordsworth), Norton Priory (a medieval monastery) and the National Coal Mining Museum.

A collection of colour slides taken by Ron Waters from the late 1950s to the early 1980s of hydroelectric development in British Columbia. The broader dissemination of these images is important in light of the current renegotiation period of the Columbia River Treaty (2014-2024) and the development of the Site C Dam. With the renegotiation of the Treaty taking place between 2014 and 2024, this project is an important record depicting the changes that have occurred.

The creation of the site has been funded in part by the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre, University of British Columbia, British Columbia History Digitization Program.

Impact of Hydroelectric Development on the Landscape of British Columbia



The Ladybird, known as the "Speed Queen of the Kootenay Lake," was built in 1922 by Bert Walton at Walton Boat Works. She was commissioned by Louis Gilbert, a proprietor of a barbershop in downtown Nelson. The Ladybird saw many victories in races in the 20s, 30s and 40s. At 1950, the Ladybird had been racing for 28 years and the decade which followed signalled the end of an era for the boat, as newer technology entered the races. In 1966, the Ladybird officially retired. She was donated to our Society in 1968 by owners Mr. and Mrs. W. A. McDonald who had purchased her from Gilbert. With the assistance of donors, the B.C. Heritage Trust, and various government employment programs, we were able to undertake a restoration project from 1986 to 1987.

In 2016, the Ladybird was removed from storage at 402 Anderson Street and brought into the light once again. She joined the Road Kings car event parade down Baker Street and brought with her many happy memories and much excitement from the community.


