

# NOTEWORTHY NELSON FIRES

- April 7, 1892: The first fire; Canvey and Barrett's store. Destroyed. Loss estimated at \$7,000 to \$4,000.
- Jan. 19, 1894: Incorporated Nelson. Destroyed. This fire resulted in public pressure that led to improvements to the city's volunteer fire department, the purchase of new equipment, and ultimately construction of the first dedicated fire hall.
- 1898: Nelson Brewery & Ice Co. Ltd. Brewery at Mill and Ward streets destroyed.
- April 15, 1903: Kootenay River Lumber Co. Sash and door factory. \$6,000 loss. Possibly the first fire photographed in Nelson and also described as the "firecrest" to that point.
- May 1, 1903: LaPointe's boarding house, Vernon Street. Three-storey building, destroyed.
- Jan. 17, 1906: House fire, Latimer and Josephine streets. Claims the lives of siblings Joseph Henry Bourgeois, 5, and Adrien Bourgeois, 1.

- Aug. 17: Yale Columbia lumber yard
- Aug. 18: Twin Garage, Lake Street
- Aug. 19: Basement of brothel, 777 Lake Street
- Aug. 21: Between two Chinese houses, corner of Lake and Hall streets
- Aug. 22: Chinese ranch buildings in Fairview, \$3,000 in damage
- Aug. 23: Chinese ranch buildings in Fairview, \$7,500 in damage
- Aug. 24: Pacific Tallow Co., 50
- Aug. 30: Attempt to burn Lambert lumber yard
- Sept. 1: Brewery on Lanning Street, \$50,000 loss
- Sept. 3: Another attempt on Yale-Columbia lumber yards
- Mar. 12: Bell Trading Co. warehouse, McDonald's Jam Factory
- Mar. 18: Allan block, Ward Street
- Mar. 20: Buchanan-Herzenstein house, Yale-Columbia mill building
- Apr. 1: Hotel, 1000 block of Columbia Street, \$6,000 damage. McAdory building, \$7,000 damage. Thompson building, \$6,000 damage.
- June 11: Sheep, Ned's ranch
- May 1, 1913: McDonald's Jam Factory, Vernon St. Last fire before the new fire hall opened.
- Jan. 24, 1915: Trinity Methodist Church. Rebuilt.
- ca. 1918: Grand Central Hotel, Vernon Street
- Early 1920s: Nelson Lumber and Manufacturing Co.
- Late 1920s: Lakeside Hotel, Vernon Street
- Jan. 25, 1928: St. Saviour's Church. Rebuilt.
- July 31, 1929: Fair building, Vernon Street where Civic Centre now stands. Destroyed. Dawn Penniket said it "went up like paper."
- July 6, 1932: Griffin Block, Baker and Ward streets. Destroyed. Where the Fink Block (Wait's News and other businesses) now stands.
- April 18, 1935: Nelson Opera House, Victoria Street. Destroyed in a spectacular final performance. As early as 1908, the building was declared a "fire trap." Cab o. miraculously survived the Opera House fire next door two months earlier.
- July 22, 1935: Columbia bottling Works, Ward Street. Destroyed. Taking the life of Annie Linebaugh, 80. This building, formerly the Nelson Standard Electric, Beresford store, Van Kamp Bakery, and Cummins' tax.
- ca. 1936: Shell Oil, Government Road. Dawn Penniket recalled: "We were up in Rosemont above the CPR hill and had a dandy view of oil drums blowing Skyswords and exploding in flames."
- July 28, 1940: Nelson Sash and Door factory, Front Street. Penniket remembered: "We watched from the ball grounds bank across the street ... The fire was a roaring and Mum and I nearly had a heart attack. There was a thousand feet. There was that up on the Wood Valeance warehouse roof hoisting it down and the fire blazing in the building behind its back."
- 1942: Kondike Hotel, Vernon Street
- 1942: Kootenay Steam Laundry, Baker Street
- ca. 1942: W.W. Powell Co. mill and match block factory
- May 16, 1944: W.W. Powell Co. lumber yard
- Nov. 23, 1949: Johnstone block, corner Baker and Josephine streets, \$200,000 damage to two apartments and seven businesses, including Nelson Electric, Greenwood Furs, Salvage, Gray's candy store, Alice's Wonderland, Cerney's barbershop, and Johnson's shoe repair. Chen Gordon McDonald, taken to hospital for smoke inhalation called it the toughest of the more than 1,000 fires he had fought.
- June 6, 1952: Nelson Farmer's Supply office and warehouse, Palm Dairies warehouse, and coal bunker of Fowler Fuel and Transfer, Railway St. Damage \$100,000 and loss of 80 tons of grain, flour, cereal, and dairy.
- Sept. 2, 1952: Nelson Sash and Door Works, 307 Front Street.
- Nov. 30, 1952: Simpson's construction and R.A. Paterson Millwork Co., waterfront. \$50,000 damage
- May 27, 1955: Strattonona Hotel, corner Stanley and Victoria. Nelson's deadliest fire. Six fatalities: Harumi Shimamoto, 20; Gertrude Eileen Eley, 68; Quentin MacDonald, 44; John Thomas Price, 85; Margaret Helen Sinclair, 73; Rudolph (Rudy) Lawrence Ernest Symington, 10.
- June 1972: Kootenay Forest Products
- June 1972: Nelson school (former Nelson High School), \$200,000 loss. Lit by a "mixed up" nine year old boy.
- June 1972: Kootenay Forest Products
- July 19, 1972: Oreneta, 503 Vernon Street. Damage of \$125,000. Six onlookers either volunteered or were conscripted to help fight the fire.
- June 15, 1972: Savoy Hotel, Baker Street. Beer parlor gutted. Arson. Repaired.
- June 24, 1973: Savoy Hotel, Falls Street. Beer parlor gutted. Arson. Repaired.
- Aug. 2, 1974: Chinese Nationalist Society, 524 Lake St. Claimed the life of Wah (Shorty) Der, 69.
- 1975: Royal Hotel and Pink Maid Laundry, Baker St. Arson. Damage minimal.
- April 26, 1975: Cito bus garage, Josephine St. \$100,000 damage. Arson not suspected. Restored.
- May 31, 1975: Blakeman's Store warehouse, 446 Baker St. Arson. Damage \$35,000 plus \$5,000 to Fields next door.
- June 13, 1975: Simpson Sears, Baker Street, and Trafalgar School auditorium, the latter a \$275,000 loss. Both arsons.
- April 28, 1970: House at 121 High Street. Claimed the lives of Winifred and Lillian Houck.
- June 1970: Kootenay Forest Products
- July 19, 1972: Oreneta, 503 Vernon Street. Damage of \$125,000. Six onlookers either volunteered or were conscripted to help fight the fire.
- June 15, 1972: Savoy Hotel, Baker Street. Beer parlor gutted. Arson. Repaired.
- April 17, 1968: Floating bandshell, Lakeside Park. Built for the 1965 International Water Pageant, the bandshell was under an order to be destroyed and had been the victim of previous arson attempts.
- Nov. 17, 1969: Queens Hotel, Baker Street. Destroyed. \$500,000 damage, including smoke damage to adjacent buildings. 20 guests evacuated.
- April 28, 1970: House at 121 High Street. Claimed the lives of Winifred and Lillian Houck.
- June 1972: Kootenay Forest Products
- July 19, 1972: Oreneta, 503 Vernon Street. Damage of \$125,000. Six onlookers either volunteered or were conscripted to help fight the fire.
- June 15, 1972: Savoy Hotel, Baker Street. Beer parlor gutted. Arson. Repaired.
- June 24, 1973: Savoy Hotel, Falls Street. Beer parlor gutted. Arson. Repaired.
- Aug. 2, 1974: Chinese Nationalist Society, 524 Lake St. Claimed the life of Wah (Shorty) Der, 69.
- 1975: Royal Hotel and Pink Maid Laundry, Baker St. Arson. Damage minimal.
- April 26, 1975: Cito bus garage, Josephine St. \$100,000 damage. Arson not suspected. Restored.
- May 31, 1975: Blakeman's Store warehouse, 446 Baker St. Arson. Damage \$35,000 plus \$5,000 to Fields next door.
- June 13, 1975: Simpson Sears, Baker Street, and Trafalgar School auditorium, the latter a \$275,000 loss. Both arsons.
- May 26, 1976: Nelson Home Furnishing, 600 block Baker Street. Upper story gutted.
- Dec. 1, 1976: Johnstone block, Baker Street. Seven stores, including Main 'n' Meat Market, Wing's Grocery, and Dee's Ladies Apparel destroyed, along with seven apartment units. Suffered two previous fires, one in 1938 destroyed the top floor, another in 1949 destroyed seven businesses as well. Now the site of BCAA.
- Nov. 2, 1977: Campus Billiards, Hall Street.
- Feb. 28, 1982: Aberdeen block, Baker Street. \$54,500 damage.
- Sept. 28, 1982: Heritage Lanes bowling alley and Big Daddy's Tonite night club, 500 block Vernon Street. \$750,000 damage. Arson suspected. Big Daddy's had been closed for some time before the fire.
- Dec. 24, 1982: Mountain Billiards, 533A Baker Street. \$10,000 damage. Arson suspected.
- Dec. 22, 1993: Kootenay Forest Products planer mill
- Mar. 1, 1993: Modern Walls and Carpets, Modern Sew. Kootenay Business Services, 400 block Josephine St. Damage \$75,000 to \$100,000. Arson.
- 1994: City of Nelson power plant
- 1994: Kootenay Forest Products sawmill
- July 28, 1997: Kootenay Forest Products plywood plant. Largest fire in the city's history.
- April 2, 1992: Trailer fire at Klein's Trailer Park. Claims the lives of Alene Beaulieu and her twin infants Samantha and David. Arson. Nelson's worst insured crime.
- Dec. 24, 1992: Mountain Billiards, 533A Baker Street. \$10,000 damage. Arson suspected.
- Dec. 24, 1993: Kootenay Forest Products planer mill
- Mar. 1, 1993: Modern Walls and Carpets, Modern Sew. Kootenay Business Services, 400 block Josephine St. Damage \$75,000 to \$100,000. Arson.
- Oct. 8, 2001: House at 215 Stibbs St. Claims the life of Lynne Elizabeth Roberts, 54.
- May 4, 2003: Nelson Museum. The W.W. Amabilis is destroyed and other artifacts are smoke damaged. Arson.
- July 3, 2003: Food and Gun Club. Destroyed. Arson.
- Jan. 18, 2006: Green block, Ward Street. \$325,000 damage.
- Nov. 10, 2007: Savoy Hotel, Falls Street. Mazatlan restaurant, Back Country Hotel, and Club 198 destroyed. Same building burned in 1973.
- Dec. 18, 2008: Trailer fire, 700 block Lakeside Crescent, claims life of Maurice John Eggle, 59.
- Dec. 31, 2009: Kootenay Seats and Wheels, Across the orange bridge. Former ASW.
- July 29, 2010: Bedfish Grill, Baker Street. Former LD Cafe.
- Jan. 6, 2011: Kerr Apartments, Victoria Street. Eighty people evacuated without injury but the building was gutted and later demolished. Nelson Home Furniture was also smoke damaged.
