



MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

2020—what a year it has been! Along with every organization, business, family, and individual in Nelson, we faced many challenges due to the pandemic. But remarkably, with professional staff, dedicated volunteers and an active Board, we have grown and flourished despite the restrictions within which we functioned.

It was certainly the year to test organizational resilience! In March 2020, we were closed to the public and we reopened in a limited capacity in June. Along with many organizations and businesses, we have been undergoing a digital transformation and throughout 2020, the staff team continued to interact with our community through exceptionally programming and exhibitions brought to you online, and in limited capacity within the Museum itself.

The Board of Directors was exceptionally impressed with the resilience of the staff team who had to re-organized and re-develop all exhibitions and programs, re-apply for grants, and search for new funding streams to ensure our viability into the future. Unsurprisingly, the financial sustainability of the organization was a consuming focus during this challenging year. Regional, provincial and federal emergency funding kept our doors open and for this we are grateful.

And I would be remiss if I did not salute the many volunteers that donate hours of time to the running of Touchstones Nelson Museum. From the Shop to the Archives to the installation of new exhibits, volunteers remain the mainstay of the organization. Dedicated members and generous donors are crucial to the ongoing stability of Touchstones Nelson Museum—your local museum, archives, Bunker, and Nelson's only Public Art Gallery.

In looking ahead, the Board of Directors of Touchstones Nelson: Museum of Art and History remained committed to Vision and Mission alignment alongside accountable yet bold Strategic Planning. In the midst of our global changing landscape, the Board and Executive Director purposely decided to strategically plan for just two years, leaving room for fluidity in the unknown. In the fall of 2020, we determined that our four priorities of the 2021-2022 Strategic Plan will include: Continuity – Carrying Forward; Social Justice; Organizational Resilience; and Communication.

The 2021-2022 Strategic Plan will not only carry the organization forward through the unknowns in funding, covid-restrictions and shifting paradigms, but will also help to create long-lasting systemic change within the Museum.

In 2020, we saw the completion of the Cold War Bunker—a project many years in the making. 2021 will also bring exciting projects, such as the City of Nelson-lead re-pointing project of our beloved building along-side many organizational-lead projects that will bring a new face to the Museum.

Communication remains a priority, both internally and out to the community—prioritizing the importance of this place, the archives, the museum, the art galleries, and the Shop. The Nelson and District Museum/Touchstones Nelson: Museum of Art and History is a cultural cornerstone and a place to feel safe and able to have your voice heard.

I would like to thank our Members for their ongoing support, and once again, I wish to thank the incredible team that keeps us afloat, lead by Astrid Heyerdahl, Executive Director. And to all the past, present, (and future!) Board Members, thank you!

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Touchstones Nelson: Museum of Art and History more than weathered the global storm that was 2020. With exceptional leadership and persistence, we managed to pivot and move forward with award-winning projects, new virtual programs, and an even greater push towards realizing the true goal of all museums, galleries and cultural spaces—to be an amplifier for all voices, to share inclusive and diverse history, to create crucial community dialogue, to broadcast the critical work of artists from across Canada, and to create positive change in society.

In other words, despite the global pandemic, our 2020 vision and mission alignment remained constant.

Vision: An inclusive society inspired by the convergence of art and history.

Mission: To be a cultural hub that provides integrative art & regional history programs to encourage new perspectives and foster a collaborative community.

Amongst the positivity, there were also many tribulations. 2020 operations were deeply affected. On March 16, 2020 we closed to the public due to the global covid-19 pandemic and during this time, the staff team shifted to working from home, developing virtual programming and an online gift shop, reorganizing and rescheduling exhibitions and grants, and much more. On June 4, 2020, we reopened our doors with strict adherence to health and safety protocols as outlined by the Province of BC and Work Safe BC.

With the 2020 Gala postponed and fundraising initiatives respectfully ceased, we focused on major sources of funding such as established foundations, the province and federal government. We were successful in receiving many emergency funding grants from various funding bodies to continue operations.

2020 encouraged us to undertake a digital transformation—bringing our community exceptional films and virtual offerings such as the Missing Voices project, and impacting all aspects of our organization from the archives, to exhibitions, programs, fundraising, communications, and administration.

Throughout 2020, the Board, Staff and volunteers continued to be guided by the 2018-2020 Strategic Plan. I thank the staff team for bringing the organizational vision to life. Lesley Garlow, Museum Educator and Stephanie Myers, Public Program Coordinator created excellent programming—mostly virtual—to continue meaningful steps towards answering the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Actions, to bring art and history to life, and to create important conversations in Nelson and beyond.

The 2020 exhibition season, curated by Arin Fay, although much changed due to covid, brought outstanding exhibitions, such as Métis Art and History - Otipemisiwak: The People Who own Themselves; Meryl McMaster: As Immense as the Sky; and Turning Pages: Celebrating 100 Years of the Nelson Public Library. Métis Art and History, in particular, was an incredible collaborative exhibition developed in partnership with the West Kootenay Métis Association over the course of two years—it was an honour to work in meaningful and reciprocal relationship with the Métis Nation here in Nelson. Thank you!

Despite a global pandemic, we are proud that the Bunker project, a multi-year endeavour involving so much of our team, was launched with great success! Thank you to Jean-Philippe Stienne, Archivist and Collections Manager, and his team of Assistant Archivists and volunteers. We have since received two awards for the Bunker: the City of Nelson 2020 Heritage Award, and a Heritage BC Award. Stay tuned for more exciting archival news in 2021.

The Shop continues to be an important source of earned revenue as well as support for local and regional artists, artisans and authors—now available online! Cindy Fillion, in her role as Visitor Services Manager, not only supports local and regional artists through the Shop, but also supports the wonderful work of the volunteers.

I would like to personally thank our volunteers and dedicated Board of Directors for the 1000s of hours of volunteer time. Our Touchstones Nelson Museum Members are also vital to the work that we do. To all our volunteers, donors, and members—thank you for your ongoing support! We could not do this without you.

We are thrilled that 2020 has concluded and that we have moved forward into 2021. Despite the many unknowns due to the continuation of the global pandemic, we are enthusiastic for 2021 projects and planned major changes. We will always be your local and regional museum, archives and public art gallery and we look forward to connecting with you—virtually and perhaps in person—throughout 2021. Thank you!

EXHIBITIONS

2020 was a year that was defined as much by chaotic and unprecedented change as it was by creative solutions. The long-term work, planning, contracts, funding, and vision that had gone into the 2020 exhibition schedule was hard won and difficult to undo, but we managed to defer and extend the schedule to honour the relationships with the artists, partners, and funders that we had forged.

As always, our vision and mandate and our dedication to support artists to the best of our ability dictated a clear way forward! The lessons learned in a year when the only constant was change, has been a challenging but empowering one — one that has taught us even more profoundly the importance of art, artists, and access. It is the visual artists, writers, filmmakers, and other creators that have made this past year tolerable and we are proud to be an organization that supports such work.

We extended the first two exhibitions of the year, Paul Walde's *Tom Thomson Centennial Swim* and the 2020 *Members Show and Sale* by several months since these exhibitions were shuttered almost as soon as they opened in February and March. We created virtual tours, online promotions, and programming for these exhibitions while closed to the public, and were very pleased to open our doors in June. Reopening has been no small feat, and a unique accomplishment when surveying art galleries from across the country that have remained closed for the duration of the year.

Turning Pages: Celebrating 100 Years of the Nelson Public Library (Curated by Anne Degrace) was installed in September and was a well-received partnership between the Museum and the Nelson Public Library, producing a publication, integrating archival materials, and co-hosting our first ever socially distanced opening event and book launch. Meryl McMaster's As Immense as the Sky was also launched in September, and has benefited from an extended tenure that has given a significant number of members, students, and visitors a chance to see this visually stunning and thematically important exhibition that we are incredibly proud to present. The last exhibition installed in 2020 and which extended into February of 2021 is Métis Art and History – OTIPEMISIWAK: The People Who Own Themselves which was made possible by a unique partnership with the West Kootenay Métis Society and a number of Métis artists, historians, and knowledge keepers. This exhibition project has been as much about relationship-building and learning to understand Indigenous protocols as it has been about programming and exhibition curation and collaboration, and we are incredibly indebted to the work and facilitation of Lesley Garlow for making this project a resounding success and a model for projects going forward. This project is part of a multi-year partnership with the Métis community and funded generously by the British Columbia Arts Council.

We look back on the exhibitions of 2020 with a mixture of pride and poignant reflection. There is a lot of thought and work and passion that goes into each years' exhibition schedule, and 2020 was no exception with well over a hundred people directly involved in or contributing to the five exhibitions that remained of the eight booked. The positive ripple effect of the creative work that is shown and experienced in our galleries is felt far and wide.

On July 8, 1917, Group of Seven painter Tom Thomson's life met a tragic end when he drowned in Canoe Lake, a popular access point to the waterways in Algonqiun Park, Ontario. One hundred years later, Canadian artist Paul Walde swam the 3 km length of the lake for his work titled *Tom Thomson Centennial Swim*.

The swim was accompanied by a series of interconnected events: a brass band with a mandolin soloist performing a new long form music composition by Walde, three synchronized swimming



routines at various points along the route, and a flotilla of canoes carrying the band. The work primarily exists in two forms - that of the event itself and an audio/video work based on the footage of the event.

Touchstones Nelson was the first gallery to premiere the video and score as an installation in Canada, and follows the unparalleled staging of Walde's previous site-specific work in the Kootenays, Requiem for a Glacier.

2020 Members Show and Sale

February 22 – September 6, 2020

The Members Show is an accessible way for artists ranging from seasoned professionals to first-time exhibitors to experience the excitement of showcasing work in a gallery setting. It also gives the Museum the opportunity to reciprocate members' support, and take a visual measure of what our community is creating. These exhibitions showcase a wild array of method and medium, from representation to abstract, traditional to experimental, and is presented as a salon-style floor to ceiling celebration of light and colour.

Both the 2017 and 2020 Members exhibitions were a beautiful and eclectic showing of the talent, dedication and passion that exists within the Nelson community and area. We were even able to host a very well-attended opening for this show!

September 12 – November 22, 2020

This was a history exhibition documenting 100 years of service to the city of Nelson in the name of community and literacy. The publication, created as a legacy facet of this exhibition project and anniversary celebration, was designed and written by Anne Degrace, with contributions by past and present library luminaries. The publication was generously funded by Heritage BC.

In the 100 years since the founding of the Nelson Public Library much has changed—and will continue to change as we enter an increasingly digital era while, as a society, needing more than ever to find ways to connect and engage with one another. Documenting that change in a comprehensive exhibition allows Nelson and community to celebrate how far we've come as well as offer a thoughtful lens to the future.

Meryl McMaster was born in Ottawa, Ontario in 1988. She earned a BFA in Photography from OCAD University in Toronto, Canada (2010). Her work has been exhibited at the National Gallery of Canada, Art Gallery of Ontario, Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, the Smithsonian's National Museum of American Indian, and more. Her awards include the Scotiabank New Generation Photography Award (2018), REVEAL Indigenous Art Award (2017), Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellow Award (2013), Charles Pachter Prize for Emerging Artists (2012), Canon Canada Prize (2010), OCAD U Medal (2010) and the 2016 Sobey Art Award long list.

We have been proud and privileged to host an artist of this caliber in our Gallery A space and continue our ongoing commitment to showcasing the powerful work of Indigenous artists in Canada.


Métis Art and History – OTIPEMISIWAK: The People Who Own Themselves

November 27, 2020 - February 20, 2021

Through partnership with the West Kootenay Métis Society and Don and Nicole Courson (President and Vice-president), as well as Maurice Trudel, Indigenous Youth Internship Program Lead, Michelle Morin, and other knowledge keepers we have created the above mentioned exhibition and programming.

This multi-year project was made possible through relationship building facilitated by Lesley Garlow, Touchstones Indigenous Educator, and also the generous support of the British Columbia Arts Council's Youth Engagement Program. Through the utilization of traditional Métis art practices (beading, and pointal painting) we have undertaken many months of artist-led workshops that have contributed to the impressive Christi Belcourt inspired installation pieces that are installed in relationship to reproductions and original work by Christi Belcourt herself. We have been incredibly honoured to work with a number of regional, provincial and National artists and also historians and knowledge keepers from far and wide.

THE COLLECTION AND SHAWN LAMB ARCHIVES

2020 was a challenging but successful year in the Shawn Lamb Archives. Reduced opening hours, and the postponement of a planned Kootenay railway exhibition (now scheduled for Fall 2022) were disappointing but did help present an opportunity - it gave the Archivist more time to focus on getting the Cold War Bunker exhibition open to the public. Assisted by a team of awesome volunteers led by Bruce and Eileen Davis, the space opened in October and features Cold War displays, dioramas, interactives and a movie.

The closures of April and May also gave the Archivist the opportunity to explore new ways of making the Collection accessible online. Our weekly Facebook Live events brought objects out from our storage vaults and the Archivist was able to share some of the histories of these remarkable items. We also embarked on a project to capture photographs and objects reflecting events and images in Nelson during the pandemic.

We received the welcome news that stage two of our project to digitize the pages of the Nelson Daily News (1920-1936) has begun. We know this has been a popular project and we hope that they will be available in spring 2021 - with the possibility of more years to follow later in the year. In 2020 the published online pages spanning the years 1902 to 1920 were viewed more than 100,000 times!

At the start of the year we enjoyed engaging with the community at an Archives Pop-up Event at Chahko Mika Mall. Two "Members Only" events gave behind the scenes access to our Archive and Collection vaults. Our weekly #ThrowbackThursdays on Facebook and

Instagram continued to generate much fun and conversation and we enjoyed sharing our latest discoveries and favourite images from the Archives. Our online content also grew with hundreds of photographs added to the Arca BC Kootenay/Columbia Digitized History website and additions to our online Collections catalogue.


There were forty-nine new entries to the Collection and Archive in 2020. Highlights included a whole chest of scouting material, Slocan Chief Cabin logbooks and a section of root from the vine that grew on the Nelson Courthouse. Another memorable item was a Standard Café matchbox discovered in the chimney of a Nelson heritage house.

and volunteers in 2020. 53 per cent of these were from private individuals with 20 per cent of our enquiries coming from writers. As always the content of the enquiries varied greatly. Example topics included Chinese restaurants, the Kootenay School of Art, the local LGBTQ+community, and bicycles. Our house histories continue to be very popular.

our team. Tressa Ford worked on a project to document and identify hundreds of photo negatives taken by Proctor artist D.Dan Morslander. The collection features many individuals in education and art circles in the 1980s and 1990s. They also help reveal the process of how D.Dan planned his mural artworks. Many examples of the photographs are available on our Touchstones Nelson Flickr website.

Riley Stewart undertook the sizable task of appraising and inventorying our Shaw Cable video archive. We have made some tentative steps to commence digitizing over 600 tapes that feature local cultural events that took place from the 1970s to the 1990s. We hope to move forward with making this collection more accessible in 2021.

Seventeen individual volunteers worked on Archival/Collection projects in 2020 contributing nearly 1,300 hours. A remarkable effort considering the obstacles our dedicated team faced this year. Maureen Attridge completed the mammoth task of verifying the details of around 17,000 local obituaries held in our Collection. A list with the details of each obituary is now available on our website. The details of around 5,000 historic plumbing permits have also been added to our website. These can reveal important details on Nelson buildings and the improved accessibility of these records is particularly valuable for completing house histories.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

THE BUNKER

In October 2020, Nelson's Cold War Bunker was officially opened to the public. Navigating Covid protocols, we invited small groups throughout the day down into the space. The response from the public has been overwhelmingly positive, and the Bunker was named the 2020 Heritage Award Winner from the City of Nelson!

Program planning is ongoing, and includes events such as Cold War era film screenings, Bunker response films, and so much more. We are delighted to have wrapped up the development phase of the project, and are looking forward to engaging the community in this historic space.







MISSING VOICES

In 2006, the second floor Permanent Museum Exhibit at Touchstones Nelson was created by a dedicated team of staff and volunteers, motivated to capture the history of the local area. As we experience the current political and social landscape, we are learning that the current iteration of the space is missing crucial elements of our collective history. Work continues to update the 2nd Floor Museum to include this past, and in the meantime we have been endeavouring to add those missing voices.

Missing Voices is a 15-part video collection of one- to two-minute shorts produced by Watershed Productions, following Nelson and area residents as they share their experiences, and speak to the void in the current museum environment where their histories should be. This series is available to share for free on the Touchstones Vimeo site.

NEW ECHOES IN THE STAIRCASE

To transform a drab, unused stairwell into a stunning conversation piece is no easy task; local artist Damien John, however, was up to the challenge. John's mural is the second instalment in the New Echoes in the Staircase series, which invites a local (Nelson and Area) artist into one of the building's heritage staircases that was once used daily in earlier days, but is now a liminal space no longer regularly used by the public. The space will no longer be forgotten and unused, but will now invoke conversations about access, behind-the-scenes work, the potential history and power contained in a building, (mis)representation and voice in historical buildings/organizations, and many other important topics.



THE SHOP

The Shop had an interesting 2020! It was off to a roaring start when the shut-down hit in March. We busied ourselves getting most of the Shop artists online using the Shopify platform. This allows our artists, specifically some smaller producers without websites, to access a broader market.

When we reopened in June, the Shop had a more refined and cleaner look. We added two artists last year – painter Abby Wilson and textile artist Irma Coumantarakis and kept all of the favourites.

We hosted five book launches following protocols - new books from Roz Nay, Judy Toews, Jane Byers, Ralph Friesen and Vera Maloff. The events were a chance for people to meet and chat with the author and get a signed copy of the book. For ArtWalk 2020 Touchstones supported two new artists in an online format through NDAC, Kim Freeman and Achille Lalonde. We were happy to participate and support NDAC and local artists.


2020 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Nelson and District Museum, Archives, Art Gallery and Historical Society engaged Grant Thornton LLP to review the 2020 financial year.
